STEM Classes and Native Plants

In September, Mrs. Mc-Kellar's Middle School STEM and Mr. Oudbier's Appleview STEM classes worked together to clean storm water before it enters the ground water or makes its way to Lake Michigan. There is only one way to do that-by planting native plants, and they planted almost 3,000 of them! The long roots help native plants survive during Michigan summers and winters. Roots also absorb pollution from storm water and use it to make food in plant's leaves then release clean oxygen and water. Many of the beautiful wildflowers will be habitat for butterflies and pollinators next summer. Students will see more native insects and animals return to the banks and the little creek that flows through the ditch. We are grateful to Sparta Education Foundation, GVSU Groundswell, and Rogue River Partners for purchasing the plants.

The curricula at many secondary schools is designed to provide students with the education they need to go on to higher learning and/or enter the workforce. While certain subjects are on the educational menu in every school, students also have opportunities to pick unique subjects that cater to their interests and potential career goals. Classes that the school requires are often listed as core classes. Those that students are free to choose are called electives.

Schools vary regarding how many elective classes high schoolers may take each year. Electives typically are a more prominent component of upperclassmen's schedules because they may have already completed most of the core curriculum requirements. Here are some tips for selecting electives.

•Go with what you know. Pick courses that tie into already established interests. If you love to write and get to the bottom of a story, then a journalism class may be ideal.

• Choose with future major in mind. If you have an idea of which subject to study in college, you can select electives that align with that major. Someone who plans to major in finance may select an elective in marketing or business management, for example.

•Think about what colleges want. Colleges accept applicants based on academic performance, but they're also looking for students who check an assortment of boxes. Think

• Diversify your skills. Richard Detweiler, researcher and president emeritus of the Great Lakes Colleges, says a top preparatory factor to earning a six-figure salary is not one's college major, but having taken a large share of classes outside of one's major. Diverse courses throughout high school and college can put students on a successful path.

Choosing electives need not be complicated. Students can opt for different strategies to select classes that will complement core learning.

WYOMING 2023

This July, some of our Spartans from the boy's cross country team traveled to Wyoming for a backpacking trip in the mountains. There were 20 people in total who went: Ted Smith, Mike Hull, Dave Oudbier, Joe Skripka, Ryan Metzger, Brian Momber, Adam Birkeland, Brandon George, Rhett Bunker, Girum Merriman, Griffin Mis, Owen Metzger, Nate Seekman, Harper Skripka, Noah Momber, Justin Bradford, Isaac Meyers and Cayden Oudbier. After surviving the grueling 22-hour car ride there, the group headed into the mountains on the Wind River Indian Reservation. All they had for the 5 days and 5 nights was what they had packed in their hiking packs. Each weighing in at around 40 pounds, the backpacks contained everything they would need for the week. Freeze-dried meals, snacks, a sleeping bag, 1 or 2 pairs of clothes, a toothbrush (maybe), and other miscellaneous things such as bug spray, bug net, flashlight, and a camera. Along with all their personal things, every group of 2 people had to carry their tent and some of the "group" items such as the cooking pot, hot chocolate, powder, water filters, and most importantly the JetBoils that heated up all the water used for cooking the food and drinks. The first stop on the way up for day 1 was to drop off drinks in the creek. This way everyone could have something to look forward to on the last day when coming down from the mountains. On the first day, the team hiked up to a high point called The Saddle (due to the surrounding area going down and back up like a saddle). After catching their breath from the hike up, it was immediately lost again after taking in the outstanding view from the top. Nothing but beautiful mountains, trees, and rivers as far as you could see. The first night was spent at a camping lot called Tillux. When they arrived there, 10 small orange tents popped up and were staked in for the night. A campfire was made and everyone ate their first of five freeze-dried meals. There was a mixed consensus of thoughts on the meals, and everyone sat around the campfire talking about the hike, what meal was the best (it was the fettuccine alfredo), and just getting a chance to take in the surroundings. The next day was a hike to Sonnicant where they stayed the rest of their time there. The campsite sat right between two gorgeous lakes where lots of fishing ensued. Every day the group got up and ate oatmeal for breakfast and then either went for a hike or took whoever wanted to go fishing out to the lake. They traveled to Lake David where some of the boys fished and others stayed back at camp, and the next day the whole team traveled to the Great Divide. The most beautiful view overlooks the reservation at around 12,000 feet of elevation. After signing the log and fishing at the Great Divide, another night was spent around the campfire enjoying the time with everyone. The next day was spent packing up, and at this point, our packs were a lot lighter (if it wasn't needed, burn it). Then was the hike back to Tillux for the last night.
