Moving Forward with Positive Intentions

In many ways, the start of the 2021-22 school year has proven to be even more challenging than last year. While we were well prepared for the start of the year, the last minute public health order requiring masks for staff and students in grades PK-6 in Kent County caught many off guard and has caused much anger and confusion in our community and region. Our staff and students have continued to do an outstanding job and have shown their resilience. We also have been able to experience many more 'normal' activities over the first couple of months of this school year when compared to last school year. My focus in this article will be on the positive things that have happened as we continue to navigate this pandemic and offer a quality education and extra-curricular opportunities for our students.

First off, at the time of this writing, we have been able to keep our

doors open, our students in school learning, and have been able to minimize disruptions. Yes, we have had positive COVID cases among our staff and students. Yes, positive cases are required to isolate and miss school, and students required to quarantine (household contacts and those linked to an outbreak) are missing days as well. But this number is far less than a year ago when all close contacts were required to quarantine. We also are far better prepared to provide remote instruction and support for any students that must miss school. Learning continues to move forward, with nearly all students receiving face-to-face instruction, and our staff continues to do an outstanding

Second, the "extra" opportunities we have been able to provide for our students this fall is far beyond what we were able to do a year ago. Our kids are going

on field trips, mostly outdoors as the weather has been nice, and they are finding opportunities for experiential learning. We were able to celebrate homecoming as a school and community, with the largest crowds we have ever had in our new stadium, while also providing a homecoming dance for our high school students. All our athletic programs have moved forward and have been virtually unaffected by the pandemic. We continue to plan for concerts, plays, and many of the other "normal" activities we are accustomed to, and are hopeful that we will be able to provide them with minimal mitigation efforts. It has been great to see our students "in action" again doing the things that they love to do!!

Finally, I have to applaud our students. While there will always be some challenges when you bring nearly 2500 students to school each day, our students have handled anything that has been thrown at them, made any necessary adjustments, and made the best of the situation. Many times I think about how much our society can learn by just watching our kids. They are happy to be in school, to be able to resume many of their "normal" activities, and have adjusted to any necessary mitigation measures to be able to do so safely. We should be proud of our kids, their efforts, and their resilience. Our kids really do not surprise me, but we can learn from them, listen to them, and must realize that they are our future. Our future leaders are in our schools, and they are watching us. Let's remember to make them as proud of us as we are of them. Thank you for supporting our children!!

The Sparta Area Schools District hereby provides notice to parents, guardians and the general public of the 2002 Asbestos Management Plan for the District. In accordance with EPA40 CFR Part 763 – Asbestos containing materials in buildings, please note: Inspections, periodic re-inspections and surveillance and related activities are ongoing within the school district buildings

according to EPA 40 CFR Part 763, 1, 2, 3, and OSHA 29 CFR Parts 1910 and 1926. Building management plans are available for review.

2021 Annual notification of the asbestos survey

Our school district has conducted an extensive asbestos survey of all of our buildings. Based on the findings of this inspection, a comprehensive management plan was drafted. This plan details the response actions that the District will be taking regarding asbestos containing material found in our buildings. Even though the High School, Ridgeview, Administration and Transportation buildings do not contain asbestos materials, in compliance with the US Environmental Protection Agency Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHRTA) of 1990, we have an Asbestos Management Plan on file at the transportation office at 429 S. Union Street, Sparta. The management Plan is available for inspection at our offices without cost or restriction during normal business hours. Our goal is to make our schools a safe place in which students can learn. Our procedures for dealing with this problem reflect that concern. Please let us know if we can answer any questions.

2021 Pest management plan

Sparta Area Schools has adopted an Integrated Pest Management program. Inherent with this are the District's efforts to reduce pesticide use as much as possible. While it may occasionally be necessary to apply a pesticide, these will only be used as a last resort. This program does not rely on routine pesticide applications to resolve problems. We use various techniques such as habitat alteration, sanitation, mechanical means, exclusion, etc. to prevent pests from becoming a problem.

You will receive advanced notice of the application of a pesticide, other than bait or gel formulations at your child's school.

This advance notice of the application will be given 48 hours before the application.

The law requires us to do this notification by using two methods. The first method required by the law is the posting at the primary entrances to your child's school. The entrances that will be posted are those entrances that have a sidewalk that leads directly to a parking lot. The second method we are going to use is the posting in a common area located by the main office of the school. Parents are also entitled to receive this notice by first-class United States mail postmarked at least 3 days before the

application. If you would like to be notified by mail please contact the Operations Supervisor at 616-887-8213. Please give the secretary your name, mailing address and what school your child attends.

In an emergency (for example, bees nest), pesticides may be applied without prior notice, but you will be provided notice following any such application.
